

Subject: English Grade Level: Elementary School DI Strategy: Learning Choices/Anchor Example

Snow Treasure Learning Choices Lesson

*Note to User: An anchor is not a strategy in and of itself, but a critical component in effectively managing a DI classroom. The Anchor example is shown below in bold.

During the language arts part of the day, we read *Snow Treasure*. Halfway through the story I introduced a Learning Choice Board. I liked this Choice Board because it allowed students to choose a task that fits their learning style, and complete an activity at the correct level of difficulty. It also covered many levels of Bloom's Taxonomy. Choices were:

- 1. Write a letter to one of the characters
- 2. Design a new book cover to go with a specific scene in the story
- 3. Create a dictionary of difficult words from the book
- 4. Create an advertisement that will make other students want to read the story
- 5. Choose specific meaningful passages and create an image for them
- 6. Write a book review
- 7. Make a new table of contents and create a title name for each chapter (explain why you chose the title)
- 8. Write a summary
- 9. Create a scene from the book

To differentiate the Choice Board activities for students, I gave everyone a formative assessment to determine their level of understanding (comprehension) of the book and important themes. Based on this information, I marked the Choice Board for each student with suggested activities. I also made a second board for my higher level students, who had the same choices, but required them to include more detail in their projects.

Anchor Activity: At the end of the novel I assigned another Choice Board as an early finisher activity. This choice board had culminating choices to end the novel. The choices included acting out scenes, creating images, making an inference table, and creating a coded letter, to name a few.
